It's about a 13 year old boy Brian, who is on his way to visit his father when the plane he is flying in crashes. Brian must learn how to survive the wilderness alone as well as deal with the emotional challenges of his parents getting a divorce. This is a wonderful book about adapting to changes, persevering through hard times and relying on God through it all.

It's recommended that students read each chapter and complete the handouts for the chapter after reading it. Often students will read the book entirely and then complete the handouts. That is not the best or most effective way of gaining full comprehension of the text.

Upon returning to school after summer break, students will turn in the summer reading packet on the 1st full day of school. They will also take a reading comprehension test over the book on the 2nd full day of school.

- What does the hatchet represent in this story? Why does it represent that?

- What is the most important life lesson that this story teaches?
